Inspirational dimension of Christmas

t has been almost a decade since I had left the university book review club. The immediate outcome was unsurprisingly obvious. The intensive discussions and reflections seemed to fly past the memory. Nonetheless, all is not lost. In one of the reviews, for instance, I came across a phrase that was striking and the same still boggles the mind for some reasons. The phrase reads; familiarity



breeds contempt. For those of us who are already familiar with the concept of Christmas may reconsider the phrase.

It is not impossible for us to carry the same bag for the entire the year and yet not realizing the value of it. Likewise in this day and age, it is highly probable for many of us that Christmas is just as good as a delicious piece of cake or a vastly decorated street without the 'beholder'. Lest Christmas lost its significance, it is imperative that we as a learning community begin to unlearn the ceremonial extravaganza.

In most events of Christmas, we often see someone on stage to deliver what Christmas means to them. There is absolutely nothing wrong in doing that. The only exception is that we rarely raise the unfamiliar question. On this note, one would like to pause and raise the same. The question is, what Christmas is not? On adding the word 'not', the question sounds

not only anti-thesis but also reversal in philosophical sense. In a way, this Theo-philosophical question is an attempt to arrive at a new dimension of Christmas. The rationale to such an attempt is essential in a couple of ways. Firstly, there is a danger of reducing Christmas narrowly to our own convenience. Secondly, Christmas entails a wider dimension that is not exhaustive or exaggerated.

The very many accounts presented to us through the canonical writings aren't just textual. If it were so, history is as good as dead. Instead, the incarnated person of Christ has provided us a way out wherein the harsh systems of the world are to be confronted at all levels. Given the existing paradoxes within our economy, science, politics, environment and education, we are faced with the enviable task to restore and re-envision the world we steward. In the context of a University like ours, the challenges are even more subtle.

The everyday experience and the encounter within the educational set up is overwhelmingly draining. On the one hand, you are drawn to the one end of the spectrum with the mirage of quality education. The same dream is echoed and sang in every seminar hall. On the other hand, you are dragged towards the opposite end of the spectrum where the seemingly available space is already occupied. In the end, you are left wondering in the manger of disillusionment. Is this phenomenon strange or unknown to us? Perhaps, the psalmist proved to be a reference point here. For easier access to the readers, one may go through the song playlist of the Vocal band, Boney M. It says; by the rivers of Babylon, there we sat down, we wept, when we remembered Zion. This sets up the tone for the new era to come amidst captivity, exploitation and injustices.

The book of the gospel of John offers a brilliant illustration of how the Word became flesh. The new dimension once again emerges here in the form of 'not'. The first chapter of John, verse 13 reads, children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision nor a husband will but from God. The inference we draw from it is the redefinition of identity of a person. Undeniably the status quo is questioned here.

Now, looking at the academic space, the question is even more pertinent in our times. As students and teachers of this University, how do we engage ourselves in reshaping and envisioning our world? Perhaps, the story of Christmas offers us a canvass to reinvent or repaint our dreams by proving us the required space and insight. The duality of the critical and the creative thinking emanates from the narrative of Christmas. In a world where truth and justice is veiled with fabricated lies and narratives, the message of Christmas continues to offer us an inspirational dimension to re-align our lives and our world.

To conclude this short reflection, in our quest for knowledge or Tapasya, may we never tire to explore the truth and justice in the face of injustices and scams! After all, the kind of quality education that we talk about can be achieved only if we dare to dream beyond the institutional dimension. Finally, may we find the space and meaning of life through the inspirational dimension of Christmas like the way the Psalmist remembered the nostalgic Zion while still in captivity!




